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FEATURED ARTICLE: PERFORMANCE MATTERS: SELF PRESCRIBING

The LMC is regularly involved in representing and supporting doctors who have been identified as having "performance" issues. The LMC has identified a number of themes which recur, and this regular feature will highlight these, so that our members can avoid these pitfalls..

A case recently involved a GP colleague being reported to NHSE for self-prescribing medication.

There may be circumstances where colleagues have considered prescribing for themselves or have been asked to prescribe for a family member or friend. While, if following otherwise safe prescribing guidelines, this may seem reasonable, it should be avoided unless absolutely necessary as outlined below.

The MDU report that Benzodiazepines, antibiotics and <u>opiates</u> are among the most common medications prescribed in episodes of self-prescribing.

Self-prescribing or prescribing for those close to you.

In GMC guidance on <u>Good practice in prescribing and managing medications</u> it states:

Wherever possible, you must avoid prescribing for yourself or anyone you have a close personal relationship with.

It goes further to state:

If you prescribe any medicine for yourself or someone close to you, you must: make a clear record at the same time or as soon as possible afterwards; the record should include your relationship to the patient, where relevant, and the reason it was necessary for you to prescribe

You must not prescribe controlled drugs for yourself or someone close to you unless:

- a.) no other person with the legal right to prescribe is available to assess and prescribe without a delay
- b.) emergency treatment is immediately necessary to avoid serious deterioration in health or serious harm.

While colleagues may feel that their experience and access to prescribing helps themselves or an individual or relieves demand on the registered GP practice, it is

crucial to protect yourself from performance review and to support independent and safe treatment by avoiding prescribing for yourself or those close to you wherever possible.

OLIVER MCGOWAN TRAINING IS NOT MANDATORY

"You may have received many emails from various organisations entitled Oliver McGowan 'Mandatory' Training. Oliver McGowan training is not mandatory, alternative training may be provided for your staff

A requirement exists under the <u>Health and Social Care Act 2020 (181, (2), 57a)</u>, "that requires service providers to ensure that each person working for the purpose of the regulated activities carried on by them receives training on learning disability and autism which is appropriate to the person's role". There is no requirement for this training to be the Oliver McGowan training. To satisfy the requirements of the act the practices must ensure staff have training on learning disability and autism appropriate to their role.

CQC response to training requirement

CQC have confirmed this approach on their website, <u>GP mythbuster 53: Care of people with a learning disability in GP practices</u>, "We do not tell you specifically how to meet your legal requirements in relation to training. You are responsible for ensuring your staff are appropriately trained to meet the requirements of the regulations".

Code of guidance

As set out in the Health and Care Act 2022, the government is also required to publish a Code of Practice to provide guidance about how to meet this new legal requirement for training on learning disability and autism. The government has now closed the consultation on the draft Oliver McGowan Code of Practice. The consultation feedback is now being analysed. We await the code being published.

Oliver McGowan Training Tiers

Some practices may still wish to use the Oliver McGowan training but should be aware of the different <u>tiers</u> that apply to staff groups.

SECONDARY TO PRIMARY CARE WORKLOAD SHIFT



Help us as your LMC, help you, your practice and your patients by supporting this crucial and potentially transformative workstream by:

One of the challenges we have faced for years in our daily work in general practice is the non-contractual workload shift from secondary care. The requests of colleagues in practices across Lincolnshire to undertake work that should be performed by colleagues in secondary care is estimated to use up to 20% of general practice capacity to address.

This excess burden on non-contractual work not only adds pressure to capacity in practices already managing increasing patient demand but can cause frustration for general practice colleagues as it affects patient journeys, affects GP-patient relationships, and can make colleagues feel undervalued in the system.

Historically, some colleagues, while knowing undertaking this non-contractual work may impact their capacity to address direct general practice generated workload, have done so to avoid patient harm, maintain patient relationships,

and to not expend more precious time requesting secondary care colleagues undertake the remedial actions themselves.

The NHSE document Recovering Access to Primary Care from May 2023 seeks to "Reduce Bureaucracy" by addressing this workload shift and improving the primary-secondary care interface.

Lincolnshire LMC and key partner organisations including ULHT, LCHS, LPFT and Lincolnshire ICB have formed an "Interface Operational Group" to address the Interface.

The main aim of this interface work from an LMC perspective is to create a framework for ongoing and sustained resolution in the workload shift you see from secondary care in your practice.

This will:

- Reduce the pressure on your capacity and time.
- Release capacity for you and your team to focus on only general practice work.
- Reduce the utilisation of precious general practice resources to undertake secondary care work.
- Improve patient experience and outcomes.
- Improve your sense of value within the Lincolnshire NHS system.

REBUILD GENERAL PRACTICE: TEMPLATE LETTER TO MPS



ACCESS TO RECORDS ICO RESPONSE TO DPIAS

Over recent weeks, a number of Data Protection Impact Assessments (DPIAs) have been submitted by GP Practices. The subject of the DPIAs is the implementation of the Accelerated Access to GP Records (AAGPR) program developed by NHS England as a method for individuals to obtain their medical records from GPs. As the DPIAs submitted are largely similar in style and content, the ICO has chosen to make the contents of the response publicly available so GPs affected are aware of the ICO's views on the matter. The ICO is content that 'potential data protection risks have been identified, and that sufficient mitigations are in place.' Practices that haven't completed a <u>DPIA</u> are encouraged to do so and make their commissioners aware. If practices identify particular data protection risks associated with providing online access, which they do not consider to be mitigated, they should consult and engage with the <u>ICO</u> and their commissioner to find a way forward.

GET READY FOR CQC'S NEW PROVIDER PORTAL

CQC's new provider portal will be available for everyone soon

Between now and March 2024 CQC are making changes to the way providers interact with them. They're introducing a range of new and improved digital services to give providers a faster, easier and streamlined way to share information with us, including a new provider portal.

The new portal will offer a better experience when submitting statutory notifications and completing some registration actions.

They've started inviting users of our existing portal to join the new portal and will invite all existing users by the end of February 2024. If you've received an invite to join the new portal, sign up now without delay.

At the moment, only those who have been invited can join the new portal. But from the start of March 2024 any provider can register on the new portal and set up their account.

Here's what to do to get ready for these changes:

- Make sure all the <u>contact details</u> we hold for your organisation are correct (you'll need to sign up to the new portal using an email address we have on record)
- Watch the introduction to our new provider portal
- As soon as you receive an invite, sign up to our new portal

If you don't receive an invite to the new portal, sign up as soon as you can from the start of March 2024

CQC's existing portal is moving to read-only

At the end of February 2024, CQC's <u>existing provider portal</u> will become read-only. That means you won't be able to use the portal to make changes or send us new information. You will still be able to access and download your saved data until the end of March 2024. Action required for users of our existing provider portal

Please note that existing accounts on our current portal will not be automatically transferred to the new provider portal. This means action is required on your part:

- Register for our new portal as soon as you are invited
- Check your inbox for invites. Invitations to join the new portal are being sent out and all existing users will be invited by the end of February 2024
- If you have not yet received your invite yet, don't worry, just make sure your <u>contact</u> details are up-to-date to receive your direct invite
- Once you're signed up to our new portal, remember to log in to the existing portal and download your saved data before the end of March 2024

MEASLES RESOURCES FOR PRIMARY CARE

You will likely have seen media coverage on an increase in cases of Measles, mainly concentrated in the West Midlands.

<u>Resources</u> have been created and are <u>attached</u> to inform your staff and patients of what to look out for and what to do if cases are suspected.

<u>Posters</u> are also included to display in practices and on practice website.

The increase in cases is also a potentially opportunity to contact any patients eligible who do not have complete MMR vaccination history.

We would encourage practices to be aware of this information and to update their staff of this as well.

PHARMACY FIRST THE SEVEN CLINICAL PATHWAYS (REFERRAL AND WALK-IN)

Pharmacy First, due to launch on 31st January 2024, comprises the existing CPCS service which includes referrals for minor acuity conditions (from 111 and General Practice) and for emergency medicine supply (from 111 only).

It also includes a new element, which will allow assessment and treatment for seven core conditions; these clinical pathways will be available both by referral and as a walk-in service for patients. For general practice, the mechanisms of triaging and referring patients into pharmacies should continue, although we anticipate that the IT solutions may change slightly.

GP END OF YEAR FORMS: SUBMISSION DEADLINE EXTENDED TO 31 MARCH

All Type 1 and Type 2 practitioners must complete the relevant certificate or form and submit to Primary Care Support England (PCSE) for work in England.

The release of both they Type 1 and Type 2 forms was delayed this year, and as a result the deadline for submitting these has been extended to 31 March 2024.

NHSE GP FELLOWSHIP SCHEME CESSATION

NHSE has announced that the NHSE GP Fellowships and Mentor schemes will end on 31 March 2024.

We would like to remind and encourage those GPs who are within 24 months of having CT's on 31 March, and who have not yet taken advantage of the NHS GP Fellowship Scheme, to sign up for the programme in advance of the 31 March deadline.

Those successful in securing a place ahead of the deadline will have funding secured for two years. Please get in touch with your local Training Hubs for details regarding how to register.

TREATMENT ROOM ENHANCED SERVICE UPLIFT STILL A LOSS FOR PRACTICES

Due to it being financially unviable, a large number of practices gave notice on the Treatment Room Enhanced Service, the ICB have now reviewed the tariff and an uplift of 20% based on capitation will be made to practices from Q3 of this financial year.

Although we welcome an uplift we ask practices to consider the financial viability of this service, even with a 20% capitation increase practices will still be making a significant loss. Points to consider:

- Have you calculated the loss you make on providing treatment room services?
- Why are you still providing an underfunded treatment room service?
- Why is your practice absorbing this financial loss?
- Is it because "it's good for patients" receiving the service or is it to the detriment of your whole practice population, when other sources of patient funding are needed to be used to prop up this service?

CQC'S STATUTORY NOTIFICATIONS

Top tips for a good experience submitting notifications to CQC

Providers must notify CQC about certain changes, events and incidents that affect their service or the people who use it. Giving CQC the right information first time means you'll need to spend less time responding to their requests for further information. Here are some top tips for getting notifications right:

- 1.If you have access to the <u>provider portal</u> (current or new), this is the easiest and quickest way for you to submit a notification.
- 2.If you're using a Word form, always download the latest version <u>from their website</u> rather than using saved versions as we change our forms from time to time.
- 3. Make sure the provider and location IDs and name of provider entered on the form are correct. It is important to remember this will have changed if you have made changes to your legal entity. You will find your provider ID and the location IDs on your latest certificate of registration.
- 4. Make sure all the fields on the notification form are completed.
- 5. Keep up to date with the <u>latest guidance</u> on submitting notifications.
- 6. You should always receive a submission notification and a reference when you have correctly submitted a notification. If you do not receive this CQC may not have received your information.

For the best and fastest way to submit notifications, sign up to the new provider portal as soon as you receive your invite.
