FEATURED ARTICLE: DDRB UPLIFT

The Government has announced it has accepted the recommendations of the 2024 DDRB <u>Report</u>. For the first year since the 2019/20 – 2023/24 multi-year deal, the DDRB has made recommendations in relation to both GP contractors / partners and salaried colleagues.

- NHS England/DHSC have now finalised how the DDRB Award of 6% for Contractors will be implemented.
- The aggregate rise in the 2024/25 GS (Global Sum) payment per weighted patient will be 7.4% (topping up the April 2024 2% GS uplift to reach this year's DDRB Award).



- This results in a new GS payment per weighted patient of £112.50 an increase of £7.77 compared to 2023/24. The OOHs deduction remains at 4.75% and in absolute terms this will change from £4.97 to £5.34, aligning with the total uplift of 7.4%.
- The value of each QOF point increase relates to the Contractor Population Index; the average practice list size rose to 9,964 on 1/1/24 and the QOF point value in 2024/25 will therefore be £220.62 compared with £213.43 in 2023/24 (an increase of 3.4%).
- The DDRB has also recommended a 6% increase to GP sessional colleagues' salary scales from 1 April 2024 (please see notes in GPC <u>letter</u>).



PRACTICE FINANCE SURVEY -SUMMER 2024

The BMA are inviting practices in England to complete their Practice Finance survey. The aim is to build evidence for the GPC England team to support the annual contract negotiations.

We appreciate how hard the past few months have been for GP contractors and their managers. This is your opportunity to feed into an evidence base demonstrating the impact of inflation and rising costs, over the last couple of years, on GP practices across England.

The survey will be close at 9am, Tuesday 17 September.

BMA recommend that respondents have relevant information to hand before starting the survey: they will need GP practice accounts for 2022/23 and 2023/24, expenditure data for April 2023 and April 2024, and information on staff numbers and practice list size.

You will have received in your practice a request to share telephony data due to a Data Provision Notice. This email will have been sent to the main practice contact registered with the CQC.

GPC have received additional documentation and messaging from NHSE on this issue. David Wrigley and Mark Coley met NHSE yesterday on the topic. They were given 24hrs notice of the data request and documentation associated with it.

The GPC are now analysing the information they have been sent and will issue a further update with more information. At the present time they ask that you defer making a decision this week and await further communication from them.

RESPONSE TO THE INTERIM FINDINGS OF THE DASH REVIEW INTO CQC'S OPERATIONAL EFFECTIVENESS

The letter outlined the CQC's acceptance of the recommendations and provided key areas of improvement.

Terroni also apologised for the CQCs past mistakes and is now committed to rebuilding trust through partnership and transparency with providers and patients.

GUIDANCE FOR GP SURGERIES ON PATIENTS RECORDINGS CONSULTATIONS

Guidance has been developed to assist GP surgeries in navigating the growing trend of patients requesting to record consultations. With patients increasingly using smartphones and other devices to record their interactions with healthcare professionals, it's important to establish clear practices that respect both patient rights and doctor privacy.

Our guidance consolidates advice from the General Medical Council (GMC), the British Medical Association (BMA), and the Medical Defence Union (MDU) to provide practical recommendations for handling recording requests in a manner that maintains trust and professionalism in the doctor-patient relationship.

For further details, this guidance draws on insights from the <u>BMA's article</u> on patient recordings, and the MDU's perspectives on <u>recording consultations</u> and handling <u>covert recordings</u>.

AUGUST 2024 GMS CONTRACT VARIATION NOTICES

ICBs will be sending out Contract Variation Notices for signature, if they have not already done so. We have had quite a few GPs and PMs asking if the LMC or GPC England have "approved" this change, or if it is "OK" to sign the contract variation.

This is a nationally imposed change. Your Union, the BMA, has announced a period of Collective Action. The current imposed GMS contract and associated funding is widely seen as inadequate to deliver 21st century General Practice.

Therefore, practices may (at any time, but particularly during Collective Action) opt NOT to sign the Contract Variation Notice. Signing may be seen as acceptance or even endorsement of the deal NHSE has imposed.

As always, these imposed GMS contract variations will take effect 14 days from the date they are served on the practice, regardless of whether or not the practice signs.

Not signing is a small but potentially useful message back to NHSE, and it will not harm patients or alter your services or funding in any way.

We will support any practice who chooses not to participate in "signing" an imposed contract.

NATIONAL MEDICAL EXAMINER'S GUIDANCE FOR ENGLAND AND WALES



Following regulations laid in Parliament in April 2024, the Death Certification Reforms come into force on 9 September 2024 (see the end of this summary for details of the regulations). From this date, all deaths in England and Wales will be independently reviewed, either by a coroner where they have a duty to investigate, or by a medical examiner.

Standards for medical examiners are set by the National Medical Examiner for England and Wales, who is appointed by the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care. This document, effective from 9 September 2024, sets out these standards, and provides guidance for implementing them and signposts to resources.

Medical examiners are senior doctors who, in the period before a death is registered (5 days), provide independent scrutiny of deaths in England and Wales not investigated by a coroner. Normally they work in this role in addition to their normal clinical duties, but will not have provided care for people whose deaths they review.

Medical examiners, supported by medical examiner officers, are based in local medical examiner offices. In England each medical examiner office has a lead medical examiner providing overall leadership to the office, and in Wales the Lead Medical Examiner for Wales has this role. In addition, NHS England employs regional medical examiners to provide regional leadership and guidance.

Medical examiners address 3 key questions:

- what did the person die from? Ensuring accuracy of the Medical Certificate of Cause of Death
- does the death need to be reported to a coroner? Ensuring timely and accurate notification in line with <u>statutory requirements and guidance</u>


